ABOUT TODAY'S LITURGY AND MUSIC

In Luke's Gospel read today, Jesus appears to his disciples following his resurrection, startling them but proving that he had truly risen from the dead and was in their midst. Like similar appearances of Jesus in the remaining Gospels, he shares a meal with his disciples. Much of today's music acknowledges that the sacramental sharing of a meal brings the presence of the Living Christ into our midst, uniting us as true disciples.

Harold Friedell was the Organist and Choirmaster at St. Bartholomew's Church from 1946-1958 and was one of the most influential composers of American church music in the 20th century. His anthem "Draw us in the spirit's tether" was composed in 1949, while Friedell served St. Bartholomew's. It is a setting of a text by Percy Dearmer, an Anglican priest and liturgist, whose "A Parson's Handbook," published in 1899, became the standard of decorum for liturgical practice in Anglo-Catholic ritual. Friedell's anthem has been included in many hymnals and has been assigned the hymn tune "Union Seminary," where Friedell taught composition and improvisation in New York City.

George Wallace Briggs' hymn "Come, risen Lord" will be sung at all services to a tune composed by William Trafka. The melody was composed to honor the ordination of the Rev. Mary E. Haddad at St. Bartholomew's in 2001. The tune is aptly named *Nova Sacerdos* (New Priest). Mary now serves as a Cathedral Canon at the American Cathedral in Paris.

YOUTH SOCIAL JUSTICE AND ADVOCACY for 6-8th and 9-12th grades.


